Both days of the festival featured storytelling from 9AM-9PM. Educational programming included six "how-to" workshops on topics ranging from gathering family memories to turning stories into songs. These were taught by our featured and regional tellers. Dr. Joel Ying, a physician and storyteller from Florida, taught a special workshop on the relationship between storytelling and healing.

Other special events included an informal Q&A with the featured tellers; a session on local history stories by Texana, North Carolina native Zula Cox; and opportunities for festival visitors to claim their voices by telling their own stories, including an open mic hour and two "drop in and tell" story swaps.

Visitors also learned the stories of the 34 quilts on display during the festival. By reading information cards to answer questions about the quilts, they could win prizes in our popular quilt hunt. The event drew visitors of all ages, from toddlers to octogenarians. Our in-person audience of 816 came from Georgia, Tennessee, South Carolina, North Carolina, Florida, Michigan, and other states and included hundreds of students and teachers who attended free of charge. We also made recordings of the festival available online; these were enjoyed by 2,005 viewers from across the country.

We once again provided sign language interpreting and Braille programs for our visitors with hearing and visual impairment. We also expanded our community outreach by offering free tickets to lowincome individuals and to individuals with disabilities and their families and were pleased to welcome a large number of new attendees from these groups.
